# Supporting families with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND)

Many parents of children with disabilities struggle to attend Halton Family Hub groups due to concerns about judgment, discomfort in mixed-ability settings, and anxiety over large groups.

Recognising these challenges, Halton 0-19(25) and Early Years Workers have collaborated to create a pioneering solution: a dedicated stay and play session at Warrington Road Family Hub specifically designed for children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND).

The innovative group provides a carefully crafted, supportive environment that prioritises a safe, inclusive space for SEND children and their families with accessible peer support facilitated by Child and Family practitioners.

During the four-week pilot, five children and their parents participated. Staff have been intentional about actively listening to children's voices and have incorporated parent feedback to continuously improve the group's structure.

## **Moving Forward**

Following the successful pilot, the group will launch in March with:

- Increased capacity while maintaining an intimate group setting
- · A developing referral process and clear eligibility criteria
- Plans to expand to a second location in Runcorn in the near future

The initial parent feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, indicating a promising start to this support initiative.

#### **Feedback**

Parents said they value the judgment-free environment and connection with others facing similar challenges. Children are engaging well, showing comfort and enthusiasm for the sessions.

This initiative marks an important step in ensuring all families feel supported within their community.











## **Innovative School Nurse Support for Special Educational Needs**

Carolyn, our dedicated School Nurse, has developed an innovative drop-in clinic at The Cavendish High Academy, a special educational needs provision in Runcorn.

This initiative addresses a critical gap in healthcare support for students with special educational needs.

## A Unique Approach to Healthcare Support

The drop-in clinic operates on an alternating weekly schedule:

- Week 1: Dedicated to young people
- Week 2: Dedicated to parents

## **Key Benefits**

#### For Students

- Confidential access to a school nurse
- Opportunity to discuss physical and emotional health
- Personalised healthcare support tailored to individual needs
- Equivalent school nurse access to mainstream school settings

#### **For Parents**

- Peer support network
- Direct communication channel with healthcare professionals
- Shared experiences and resources

#### Impact and Feedback

## **Community Engagement Highlights**

The Start for Life Wellbeing Team launched two key initiatives in January:

#### **Baby Shower Event**

- First baby shower hosted at Warrington Road
- Timed with well-baby and midwifery clinics
- · Highly attended and well-received

#### **Comprehensive Family Support Pathways**

### **Neonatal Pathway**

- Developing a dedicated neonatal care pathway
- · Health visitor conducting regular visits to Warrington Hospital's neonatal unit
- Establishing strong connections between hospital and community services

#### **Pre-Birth Pathway**

- Implementing joint visits between social care and team members
- Showcasing effective inter-agency partnership
- Providing proactive support from pre-birth through early childhood

# Breakthrough in Infant Feeding Support in Halton

#### Halton has achieved a significant milestone in infant feeding support:

- 6-8 week breastfeeding continuation rate: 37%
- Unprecedented 12% increase over two years
- Highest recorded rate in over a decade
